THE COMMUNIQUE points out that Johnson not only did not mention by name who started the war, what it was fought over, or who the anti-Nazi allies were (the Soviets lost 20 million people, with 1.700 cities destroyed and 70,over the face of Europe.'

"This is a gross attempt to Europe from fascism," the official statement says: it then contrasts Roosevelt's praise of the army and the people of the U.S.S.R. 'whose example and selfishness,' FDR is quoted, 'in the struggle against tyranny and oppression are an inspiration to all united in the common struggle for victory.'
