## **Cleveland's Most Internationally Famous Citizen to Address Forum**

This Saturday's Forum speaker hardly needs an introduction. He is Cyrus S. Eaton, Cleveland's most internationally famous citizen. Care to dispute the description? What other Clevelander has chatted with Premier Nikita Khrushchev and the editors of *Pravda* and *Izvestia*, discussed the dangers of nuclear war with Niels Bohr in his Copenhagen home and met with scientists from all over the globe at Nova Scotia and Vienna?

And who else among us has traded criticism in the glare of international publicity with J. Edgar Hoover and the chairman of the House Un-American Activities Committee?

Mr. Eaton's financial and industrial empire has been mapped before. The railroads like to claim him as their very own because he is Chairman of the Board of the Chesapeake & Ohio, but power companies and mining enterprises have almost equal rights to him.

Since returning from Russia, Mr. Eaton has been inundated with speaking invitations from every major city in the United States and Canada. His appearance has attracted all-time record crowds at meetings he addressed at the Canadian Club, the Cleveland Advertising Club, the National Press Club in Washington, the Kansas City Chamber of Commerce and the Economic Club of Detroit. Present in the Kansas City audience was former president Harry S. Truman who had never previously participated in a Chamber of Commerce function in that city which has served as his lifetime headquarters.

His forum address Saturday will mark the last of a series of speeches in which he has been analyzing the international outlook in the light of his observations on his visit to Soviet Russia. The seventy-five-year-old industrialist has said that he "will sign off with this Forum speech."

*A number of interesting slides of Mr. Eaton's trip will be shown before the Forum goes on the air at 1:00 p.m. It would be wise to be seated advantageously and early.*
