Dear Mr. Eaton,

I understand that Professor Rotblat wrote to you recently with full details of the scientists who had accepted invitations to the Pugwash meeting. Since that letter I have heard that Professor C.H.Waddington, of the Institute of Animal Genetics, West Mains Road, Edinburgh 9, will be able to attend but will need financial assistance. The return fare to Pugwash would be approximately \$520 in his case.

I have also heard that Professor Brandt Rehberg of Copenhagen and Dr. D.S.Kothari of India will unfortunately be unable to attend.

With regard to visas, I have now had details from the Russian participants in the Conference. They tell me that they have applied for visas at the Canadian Embassy in Moscow, and they intend to leave Moscow for Canada on July 3rd, travelling via Prague and Paris with a night stop in Paris. I believe that Professor Rotblat has already asked you to send a formal invitation to Professor Thirring, who was told that this was necessary by the Canadian Consulate in Vienna. If this is a standard requirement of the Canadian authorities it would be helpful if you would send such letters of invitation to all those who need visas for entry to Canada to attend the Conference.

The arrangements for the Conference appear now to be proceeding satisfactorily and there seems every prospect of a most useful and important meeting.

Dear Mr. Eaton,

I am answering your letter of May 22nd to Professor Rotblat since he is at present abroad.

Thank you very much for the steps you are taking to facilitate travel arrangements. I had an urgent letter from Professor Thirring of Vienna (Austria), expressing anxiety about a return reservation in the height of the tourist season and saying that the money was required as soon as possible in order that the provisional reservations should not be lost. Accordingly I sent you today the following telegram:

"WOULD BE GRATEFUL IF YOU COULD MAKE AVAILABLE IMMEDIATELY TO OLIPHANT THIRRING(VIENNA) LACASSAGNE POWELL ROTBLAT MONEY FOR FARES TO PUGWASH STOP AMOUNTS REQUIRED AND ADDRESSES AS SHOWN IN ROTBLAT'S LETTER STOP ENQUIRIES SHOW EARLY BOOKINGS ESSENTIAL".

You will note that I did not include Professor Waddington's name in the list of fares to be sent. This was because you would not have received my letter telling of his acceptance of the invitation. I should be grateful if you would send the money for Professor Waddington's fare direct to him.

Professor Thirring mentioned in his letter that your invitation had arrived and he was very grateful for this. I have sent him a telegram saying that he can expect to hear from you very soon on the question of the money for his fare.

You will gather from the text of the telegram that I would prefer you to send the money direct to each participant. This will save delay and avoid the difficulty of currency transfer from Britain. I shall send you details of expected flight numbers and arrival dates at Montreal as soon as I have them.

I think it would be very good to invite someone from McGill to attend the meeting. Unfortunately I am not quite certain of the most appropriate person to ask. It has been suggested to me that Professor J.S.Foster might be invited. If however you could suggest someone else more suitable I would be pleased to act on your advice.
